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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Lake Nona Middle School serves 1710 students enrolled in grades sixth through eighth. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 58% Hispanic and 42% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 79% White, 10% Black, 0% Native, 7% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 4% Multicultural students.

The administration is led by Principal Robert McCloe. Lake Nona Middle School is proud to offer many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Latinos in Action, AP Spanish, a thriving award-winning performing arts program, high school level math, world languages, and science classes. Extracurricular activities include PRIDE Club, SGA, NJHS, Battle of the Books, FBLA, and a STEAM and Robotics Club.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Lake Nona Middle School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2012 and the number of books per student is 7. The American Association for School Libraries has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Lake Nona Middle School does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- SEL titles are representative of our population.
- The age of the collection is up to date.
- The average readability for titles is below our student achievement data.
- Additional digital resources need to be purchased.
- My priority for purchasing will focus on Hispanic students and Hispanic heritage.
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project expectations as well as the 900s, Geography and History section.

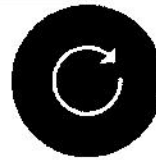

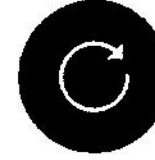

Notes

- Language section is high due to the number of translation dictionaries.
- History and geography section are large and still need to be weeded.
- Fiction section needs to be weeded as nonfiction to fiction percentage in the collection needs to be more balanced.
- SEL titles percentage is on target. .
- More diverse titles need to be added to the collection.

Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Lake Nona Middle School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:
